REFLEX HPV TESTING Information for Physicians

What is the purpose of reflex HPV testing?

The purpose of reflex HPV testing is to detect the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) in a Pap test sample and to help decide what follow up is needed for women in specific age groups with a low grade Pap test result (ASC-US or LSIL).

Who is eligible for a reflex HPV test?

The lab will automatically perform reflex HPV testing on women ≥30 years whose Pap test result is ASC-US and for women ≥50 years whose Pap test result is LSIL. (See excerpt from Toward Optimized Practice Clinical Practice Guideline below.)

What if my patient's reflex HPV result is positive?

Referral to a colposcopist is recommended for women with a Pap result of ASC-US who are ≥30 years of age or LSIL who are ≥50 years of age **and a positive reflex HPV result**. These patients are classified as high risk and require follow-up care to determine if treatment is required.

What if my patient's reflex HPV result is negative?

Routine screening in accordance with the Clinical Practice Guideline (CPG) is recommended for women with a Pap result of ASC-US who are ≥30 years of age or LSIL who are ≥50 years of age and a negative reflex HPV result. The risk of cervical cancer in the next 3 years for this population is approximately the same as women who have a normal Pap test result.

What if my patient has had the HPV vaccine?

The HPV vaccine does not protect against all HPV strains that cause cervical cancer. Even if your patient has had the HPV vaccine they should continue to screen in accordance with the CPG recommendations.

Will my patient's Pap test and HPV result be sent in the mail?

The Alberta Cervical Cancer Screening Program (ACCSP) is coordinated by Alberta Health Services in partnership with healthcare providers. The ACCSP mails Pap test results to women across Alberta. These letters do not say whether HPV testing was done, but they do say whether follow-up care is needed based on the Pap test result in combination with the reflex HPV test. Pap Test Result	Recommended Management
Atypical squamous cells of undetermined significance (ASC-US)	Women ≥30 years (The lab will automatically perform reflex HPV testing)
	 ◆ HPV Negative → return to routine screening as if cytology was negative
	 ◆ HPV Positive → refer for colposcopy
	 ◆ HPV Indeterminate → manage as per women 25-29 years
Low-grade squamous intraepithelial lesion (LSIL)	Women ≥50 years (The lab will automatically perform reflex HPV testing)
	 ◆ HPV Negative → return to routine screening as if cytology was negative
	 HPV Positive → refer for colposcopy
	 ◆ HPV Indeterminate → manage as per women 25-49 years
